On November 10th 1966 James "Jim" Fisher began working for the City of Baltimore, nearly 50 years ago. He started at Memorial Stadium and worked there until its demolition in 1996.

In his first job, he was hired by Recreation and Parks as a laborer before enlisting in the Army. After leaving the military, he apprenticed as an electrician and was hired by the City as an Electrical Supervisor. Jim stayed at Memorial Stadium throughout multiple department mergers until he ended up with DGS in Facilities Maintenance.

Jim has two memories that stick out over the years. He was working in Memorial Stadium during the Orioles 1983 World Series run. The other memory was maintaining the ice rink at the stadium and driving the Zamboni. Occasionally he would drive it across the City (with a police escort traveling 10 mph) to clean the ice at other City owned rinks.

Jim enjoys the variety and challenge of coming to work each day. He said "You never know what you will run into." But if he could change one thing about work it would be the CitiBuy procurement system.

Jim is married, has 5 kids and 10 grandchildren and lives in the suburban community of Rosedale.

New Painting coming to War Memorial



The painting “Maryland Over Flanders”, slated to hang in the Maryland War Memorial Building, depicts the Sopwith Dolphin fighter plane flown by Captain Francis Warrington Gillet, RAF, as he downed two German Fokker DVII fighters over Flanders on November 10, 1918 – one day before the Armistice that ended World War 1. Gillet was born in Baltimore in 1895 and volunteered for Britain’s Royal Flying Corps in 1917. He flew combat over France and Flanders from March 1918 until the end of the war in November, and was credited with downing 20 German aircraft.

Gillet is recognized as one of the most successful American flying aces of World War I, second only to Captain Eddie Rickenbacker. He is also the highest scoring pilot to fly the Sopwith Dolphin fighter plane. Because he flew with Britain’s Royal Flying Corps (later Royal Air Force or RAF), Gillet is largely forgotten today. Consequently, the Western Front Association - East Coast Branch is pleased to focus attention on his record as we move into the centennial of American participation in World War 1.



The WFA East Coast Branch (USA) has been around since 1990 working to promote wider understanding of World War 1.



To apply for a position create an account on www.governmentjobs.com. Retain the application updates as the Human Resources Office periodically reviews them. The more information provided, the better your chances to receive a higher consideration for the job or promotion. Also, using this process allows you to scan and add information to your account. Items you may want to scan include but are not limited to: résumés, cover letters, certifications, and relevant licenses you hold.

The website also has a Job Notification section that sends reminders once positions are posted with application deadlines.

A Short Story about Abel Wolman



The historic Municipal Building in Baltimore’s Downtown adjacent to City Hall bears the name of Abel Wolman. Who is Abel Wolman? Abel Wolman is the native Baltimorean engineer who was born, grew up, educated, served, and died in Baltimore. He received an Engineering degree from Johns Hopkins University and held the position as Chief Engineer in the Maryland Department of Health. Working with the esteemed chemist Linn Enslow, Abel Wolman’s demonstrated a standard method of chlorinating water. He created a plan to provide safer drinking water for Baltimore. His contributions to present clean drinking water not only helped the city but raised water quality in the states that adopted this standard method.

Abel Wolman’s achievements extend beyond his contribution to water treatment as he was involved in many fields that helped to change hygiene around the world. He is one of the founders of the Water Pollution Control Federation, now known as the Water Environment Federation, and served as president of the American Public Health Association. His commitment to improving public health advanced regional planning efforts that protect the public against the use of the radioactive substances in the manufacturing of medications or during industrial applications. As a professor at Johns Hopkins teaching sanitary engineering to students from all over the world, his impact was profound. By co-founding various engineering departments and the School of Public Health, he propelled Johns Hopkins University to excellence in many fields. His life’s work continues to be celebrated beyond his passing in 1989.
